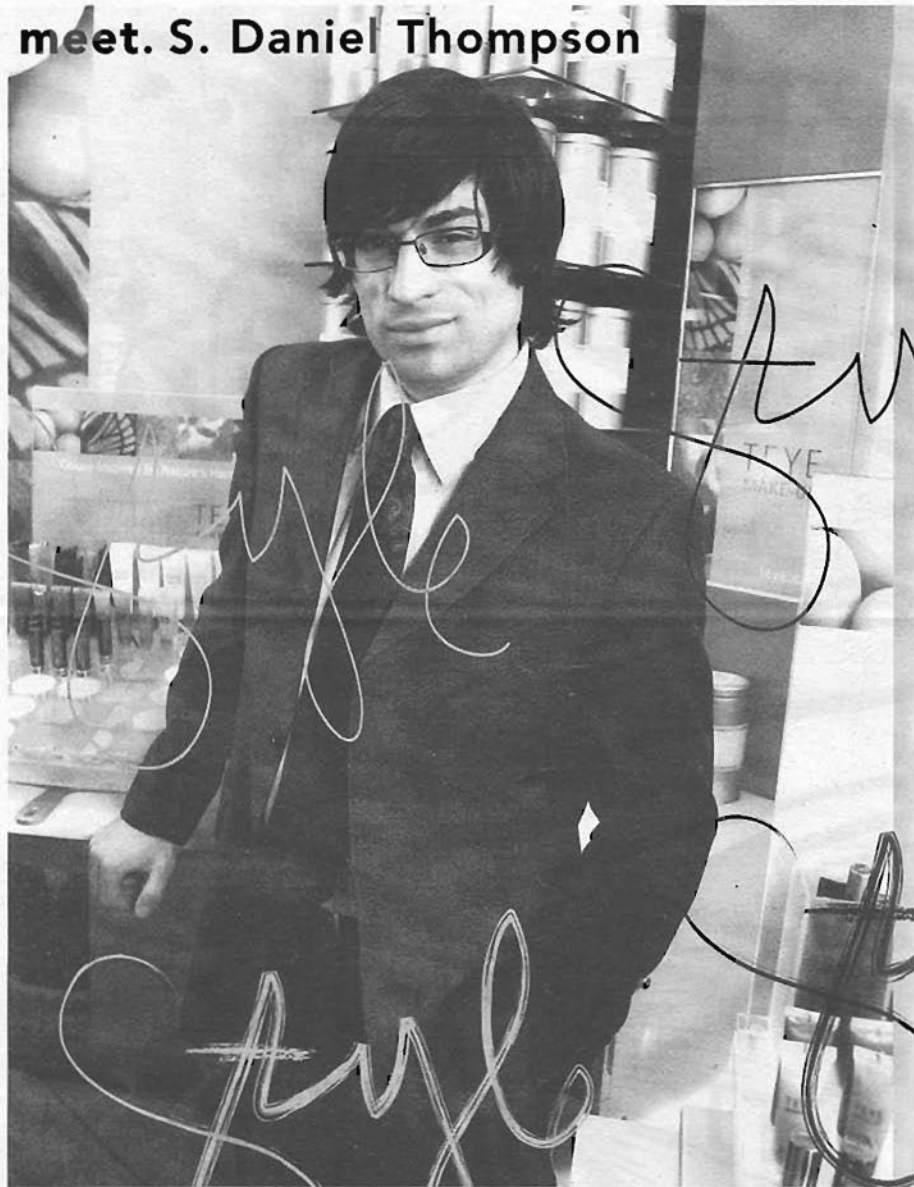




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## meet. S. Daniel Thompson



### WHO IS HE?

S. Daniel Thompson is the creative director of TEYE International, Inc., the exclusive product line carried at Oasis Wellness Centre and Spa (55 Mill, 416-364-2626, [www.experienceoasis.ca](http://www.experienceoasis.ca)), the 23,000-square-foot spa that just opened up in the Distillery District. He now oversees the development of 25 skin care products and 144 makeup products.

### WHAT'S UP WITH TEYE MAKEUP?

Thompson, who created the line, says the mineral-based line is designed to allow the skin to function and breathe as if there were nothing on it at all; it's made from the same ingredients that doctors use on skin immediately following any type of cosmetic or surgical procedure. And the foundations are actually four products in one: coverage, setting powder, under-

eye concealer and broad-spectrum sunscreen. "They protect better than any chemical sunscreen on the market."

### THE PERFECT DAY IN TORONTO:
